


# Two Local Authors Will be Guest Speakers of Friends








Hands" and "Wings in the Wind"

#### Kwik Trip Fundraising Program has ended---

As you know Kwik Trip has discontinued their Milk Moola Fundraiser--we saved caps and bag tops from specially marked Nature's Touch products. In recent years, Merl Linder has been

doing the counting, tallying up and the paperwork for the program. Below is a bit of info I got from Merl:

"Kwik Trip's Milk Moola Program ran for fifteen years and Kwik Trip gave over four million dollars to thousands of organizations. Our Friends group started collecting milk caps eleven years ago. We collected more than 45,000 milk caps and bag tops for a rebate of over \$2,300 we received from this program."

Before Merl took the job over, Dave Novitske (a former member of the Friends) did it for awhile and for a period of time the library staff helped do the Milk Moola program. #### SAVE THE DATE---

Victoria Houston will be at the Onalaska Library on Monday, September 23, 2019 at7:00 PM. She is the author of the popular Loon Lake Mystery Series which are set in the Northwoods of Wisconsin against a background of fishing. She has written eighteen books in the series, the latest was out in June, "Dead Big Dawg."

Victoria was born and raised in Rhinelander. In her teens and twenties, she was the classic hometown girl who couldn't wait to leave but thirty years later she has returned to her home town and bases her popular mystery series on the regions' fishing culture.

Houston's mystery series was featured in a story on the front page of the Wall Street Journal and on NPR's "Talk of the Nation" with Neal Conan.

In those thirty years she was gone from Rhinelander she has written over seven non-fiction books; her highly recommended book "Alone After School—A self-help guide for latchkey children and their parents" was a national best seller.

She also worked as a feature writer for magazines and newspapers and in public relations working with people such as Abigail Van Buren, Erma Bombeck and Gary Trudeau.

North Wisconsin makes a great setting for Victoria's books and she enjoys the fishing as much as the writing.



# "American Mirror" By Deborah Solomon The Life and Art of Norman Rockwell

This is a spirited and authoritative biography of the painter who provided twentieth-century America with a defining image of itself. As the star illustrator of the *The Saturday Evening Post* for nearly half a century, Norman Rockwell mingled fact and fiction in paintings that reflected the we-the-people, communitarian ideals of American democracy.

Who was this man who served as our unofficial "artist in chief" and bolstered our country's national identity? His faith in the power of storytelling puts his work in sync with the current art scene. This book brilliantly explains why he deserves to be remembered as an American master of the first rank.
